ABOUT THE CERTIFICATE

Housed in the Center for Child and Family Policy, the Certificate program focuses on how research translates into practical solutions for children.

The Experience

- Gain skills to execute effective policy-oriented research.
- Explore child and family policy issues through interdisciplinary study.
- Work with faculty members to conduct original research on real-world policy issues.



The certificate teaches students how to:

Analyze issues facing children, families, and society.

Apply analytical skills to study these issues with empirical rigor.

Engage in research that informs policy and practice.

CURRICULUM

Certificate students complete six courses:

- Three required core courses
- One methodology course
- Two elective courses

Required Courses

Child Policy Research (Cornerstone)
ChildPol 250S/ PubPol 242S

Independent Study or Honors Thesis
ChildPol 393
*Requirement may also be fulfilled with equivalent in another department with permission from certificate director

Multidisciplinary Approaches to Contemporary Children's Issues (Capstone) ChildPol 495S

Methodology Course
*Requirement may be fulfilled with Capstone Seminar in Special Topics in Public Policy: Research Methods for Social Policy (PUBPOL 490S-01) or a research/ empirical methods course in the department of the student's major

Electives

Two elective courses may be selected from across academic departments such as psychology, neuroscience, public policy, sociology, economics and education.

Interdisciplinary Approach

Building on the core classes, students work with a faculty mentor to customize an interdisciplinary instructional program.

OPPORTUNITIES

Conference Travel

Certificate students are eligible for a travel award from the Center for Child and Family Policy to attend a national research conference, such as the American Educational Research Association Annual Meeting.

Research Fellowship

The Jacqueline A. Morris Fellowship provides opportunities for financial support to undergraduate students interested in conducting research in child and family policy.
